

Dear Friends,



Awareness for National Service Dog Month

September was National Service Dog Month and we celebrated the amazing work service dogs do while educating many on service dog-related issues. Under the My Dog Is A PRO theme, our graduates and volunteers helped educate the public on the importance of task-trained service dogs, their role for

people with disabilities and service dog etiquette. Through interactive quizzes, events, corporate partnerships and media, our education on service dog access has reached more people than ever. Our supporters made a pledge to protect the


rights and safety of service dog teams – a critical goal of our advocacy program. And we were featured in 436 media stories. Views to our website increased 80% and we reached 3.8 million people on social media, increasing awareness of our mission.

SURVEYING SERVICE DOG USERS

Canine Companions spearheaded an effort to better understand the real-life impact that poorly trained dogs have on service dogs around the world. In collaboration with Assistance Dogs International, our survey reached over 1,500 service dog users from 50 ADI-accredited service dog programs across three continents.



Zoe and Zelda's Legendary Bond

When 12-year-old Zoe and her family started the process to apply for a service dog from Canine Companions, they were hoping for a dog that would help Zoe be more independent. They found that and so much more in Service Dog Zelda.

Zoe was born with spina bifida and has used a wheelchair to get around since she was 18 months old, making some daily tasks a challenge. Last year, she was matched with Service Dog Zelda.

Zelda retrieves items Zoe may drop, such as her phone, and even helps her get ready for the day. Because Zoe gets dressed on her bed, and not in her wheelchair, if she drops a sock or clothing that is out of reach, Zelda is there to help. She also opens doors for Zoe using her nose to push automatic push plates, which is a crowd-favorite task at their church.

These types of tasks allow Zoe to turn to Zelda, rather than her parents or her peers, for help. Having Zelda by her side has been life-changing, and according to Zoe's father, Jay, Zelda is seldom far away. This is especially meaningful when Zoe needs to spend time in the hospital or at medical appointments.

"This past year has been a difficult one with many procedures," shares Jay. "When Zoe had the same surgery five years ago, it took her out. This time, her spirit never broke. I attribute that to having Zelda by her side."

Service Dog Zelda has meant increased independence and confidence for Zoe. But Zoe's father says, Zelda has meant so much more.

"I see a best friend. I see someone who has taught Zoe to be thoughtful and mindful of others, taught her responsibility and to become a member of the family," he shares. "We can't imagine life without Zelda."

Dynamic Duo Provide Beacon of Hope

At the Children's Hospital of Orange County (CHOC), patients can receive care from a special dynamic duo. Facility Dogs Lois and Odessa play an integral part on the child life team and have direct impacts on patients' clinical outcomes.

Lois and her handler, Child Life Specialist Chloe, help hospitalized children and teens meet their clinical goals. "Lois provides endless support, whether it is motivating a young child to walk after surgery, helping educate a patient about a procedure or snuggling with a patient during a difficult conversation," Chloe shares.

Child Life Specialist Janessa and Facility Dog Odessa work in the hospital's mental health inpatient center. Odessa helps decrease patients' stress, anxiety and discomfort through deep pressure therapy and encourages self-expression through pawprint painting. Janessa shares, "Odessa provides a soft place to land when emotions are hard to process, listens intentionally and non-judgmentally and offers unconditional love and acceptance."

Together, they provide a beacon of hope and joy, helping to move patients forward on their important journeys.

SUPPORT Behind Bars

Nicole Swanson works for the Augusta State Medical Prison in Georgia as an occupational therapist. For 10 years, she has seen the effects of incarceration on the health of prisoners. She works with inmates who

are recovering from surgery or an injury, underlying illnesses and inmates who have feelings of isolation and depression. But, she wanted another tool to help her patients.

Nicole knew about Canine Companions because her daughter, Lily, was a volunteer puppy raiser with the college puppy raising program at the University of Pittsburgh. "I knew that there were so many ways that I could incorporate a facility dog into my work and that Canine Companions was the organization to help me," says Nicole.

Nicole was matched with Facility Dog Westley in February. "Westley doesn't care why the inmates are here. He helps with balance, sensory issues and therapeutic interventions," she says. "He has brought joy to so many people – including our staff. He's has allowed me to connect with my patients in a much more positive way."

Disability inclusion consultant Rosemary McDonnell-Horita of Berkeley, California, had Canine Companions Service Dog Eureka by her side to help her as a child and teen. A few years after Eureka's retirement, Rosemary applied for another service dog to help her in adulthood. Earlier this year, she was matched with Service Dog Dom, who is expertly trained in more than 45 tasks to enhance her independence.

With a wagging tail, Dom picks up dropped items, turns on and off lights, opens and closes doors, and more. "Dom is so good at his job. When we're home around the house, he's always waiting to see what I need and there to help with a task. When I'm in public, I feel safe and confident with him by my side. He even intuitively puts his head on my lap when I'm getting anxious," shares Rosemary.

Rosemary continues, "I have an overwhelming sense of safety when we're together. He's such a good boy."

Air Force Veteran Gets a Canine Co-Pilot

U.S. Air Force Veteran Nicci Ward has post-traumatic stress disorder (PTSD) after experiencing military sexual trauma, which is sexual assault or sexual harassment experienced during military service. The VA states 1 in 3 female service members and veterans experience some form of military sexual trauma. In 2020, Nicci was matched with Service Dog Dubs, who is trained in tasks to mitigate symptoms of Nicci's PTSD.

Nicci shares, "I was fortunate to be united with Service Dog Dubs, who supports me every day." She continues, "Dubs reduces my PTSD symptoms. He wakes me up from nightmares, creates space for me in a crowd and interrupts my anxiety attacks before they escalate to an unmanageable level."

Sometimes, Dubs even knows Nicci is anxious before she does. "There have been numerous times when **Dubs has alerted me, and I didn't even realize I was displaying behaviors leading up to a panic attack**, such as heavy breathing and sighing heavily. He just knew what to do, and he calmed me down."

Nicci continues, "It's an incredible gift and privilege to have Dubs by my side."

Jim's high frequency hearing loss means he misses the day-to-day sounds of a kitchen appliance or the doorbell. But it also means he cannot hear his wife calling him for help, or his grandchildren trying to get his attention.

It was one of these moments that gave Jim the wake-up call he needed to apply for a service dog to help with his hearing loss.

Jim and his wife, Kathleen, have been involved with Canine Companions for several years as puppy raisers in Houston. Jim knew the life-changing impact a service dog can have, but he always believed someone else needed it more. Now matched with Service



Dog Koogler, Jim has discovered just how much he needed one himself.

"What I learned is, I don't know what I don't hear," says Jim. "Koogler has started alerting me when my name is called in crowded places, like restaurants and coffee shops, because I can't distinguish my name from others'."

Jim says the biggest change is that he feels much more

comfortable with his hearing loss. "With Koogler present, I don't have to explain that I am hard-of-hearing."

Koogler came into Jim's life at the perfect time, as his condition progresses. Jim says, "Koogler is going to keep getting better as my hearing gets worse."

A Friendlier COVID-19 Screening

For decades, Canine Companions has partnered with service dog organizations that serve those whose needs fall outside of our mission, including Early Alert Canines (EAC). EAC trains service dogs to alert people with diabetes to changing blood sugar levels through their exceptional sense of smell. EAC saw an opportunity to put that sense of smell to use in a new way.

“When the COVID-19 pandemic started, I began working on how dogs could detect the virus through smell as an effective way to ensure safe gatherings,” recalls Carol Edwards, EAC executive director. “Through our partnership with Canine Companions, we were able to successfully train two dogs as COVID-19 Medical Detection Dogs.”

Using dogs from Canine Companions, further trained by EAC’s talented staff for COVID-19 detection or diabetes management just makes “scents”!

A Dose of Generosity

Lee’s once bittersweet tears are now happy tears – Tova graduated as a facility dog! Marietta and Lee met her new handler together, and Lee and Marietta recently returned their next puppy, Deen, to start professional training.

From Volunteer To Dream Career

When Leah became a volunteer puppy raiser for Canine Companions, she turned her lifelong hobby of dog training into a purpose. Her passion for training dogs led her down the path to a career as a service dog trainer.

Leah began raising puppies as a college student pursuing a career in animal science, where she helped launch a successful puppy raising club at Texas Tech University. She quickly knew she wanted to take it a step further.

face, as Waverly applies deep pressure across her legs to control Nika's muscle spasms.

"As parents, nothing makes us happier than when Nika expresses true joy, and we have been able to see so many of these moments since having Waverly in our lives," shares Nika's parents, Sarah and Stephen.
